IT'S TIME

Save the Planet has been calling for emergency action to restore a safe climate since 2013 with a target of net negative emissions in under 10 years. The policies we wrote seven years ago are unchanged and reflect the work party founder Adrian Whitehead was doing back in 2006.

Today, despite much of the East coast of Australia burning, Save the Planet is still the only party with policies that have any chance of saving our future. See the last section of this newsletter for a quick glance at relevant party policies from a climate emergency perspective.

This incessant failure by our state and federal leaders to act on global warming in the face of overwhelming evidence is nothing short of a crime against humanity; a crime which today's leaders must one day be held to account for. But it will only happen if we halt and reverse global warming before our societies collapse. We are literally in a fight for our lives and the lives of our children.

HELPING SAVE THE PLANET

Save the Planet is a volunteer-run, self-funded organisation with no major donor/financial supporter. We need your help if we are to increase our impact. Below we list the different tasks you can do:

Candidate - run to spread the climate emergency message (see article below)

Campaign Manager / Campaign Support - support a candidate in their campaign.

Social Media Generator - make content and distribute on Save the Planet's social media accounts

Newsletter Writer - help produce a regular newsletter

Merchandise Manager - this is a single person job but you would need some storage space to keep stickers, mugs and t-shirts etc.

Membership Manager - manage membership data.

RUNNING AS A CANDIDATE

As you may be aware, Save the Planet recently joined forces with another climate party to successfully register as a political party.

If you understand the climate emergency and are of good character, you should consider running as a candidate in the Federal election (2022 or earlier). At the very least you should consider encouraging others to run and supporting them.

SAVE THE PLANET CANDIDATE

Although I've been an active volunteer and campaigner for Save the Planet since 2012, I only took the step to become a political candidate in my local area in 2018 for the Victorian State election, and then as a candidate in the Moorabool Shire Council by-election at the end of 2019.

I'm actually really an introvert and would have preferred 'anyone else' do it, but nobody else was 'doing it', so I had to step up. I had a limited budget, limited time to spend campaigning, and an even more limited campaign team, but even so, I ran two election campaigns that I was pretty happy with.

A radio interview, a couple of pieces in the local newspapers, and several candidate forums, and I've learned a lot about the process along the way and my skills of presenting and answering questions have improved as I've progressed – and will no doubt continue to do so. My advice for anyone thinking about running as a candidate is: there is never an ideal time, so just jump in and have a go. Speak from the heart about what you know to be true. We need to urgently fix this problem we've created and we need all the voices we can get out there.

Save the Planet wishes to thank Lindsay for his great efforts over the years and especially his 13% of the primary vote he got running on a pure climate emergency platform - which means over 1 in 10 people voted for a climate emergency response by council.



CLIMATE EMERGENCY DECLARATION CAMPAIGN STILL GROWING

The local council Climate Emergency declarations that Save the Planet candidates helped start in the City of Darebin, Victoria in Dec 2016, has grown to over 1,300 councils and countries. These declarations to date cover a population over half a billion. Included in this number is countries that have declared such as Ireland, Argentina and Bangladesh. The EU has declared but is not included in the number. Eighty-five Australian councils have passed climate emergency motions including all but two capitals. The Climate Emergency Declaration campaign along with Extinction Rebellion and the School Strikes/Fridays for Future has been paradigm shifting in how we talk about climate. The Oxford Dictionary named 'climate emergency' the word of 2019.

However, to our knowledge, none of these governments that acknowledge the climate-emergency have begun to approach the full-scale mobilisation required for a climate emergency response if we want any chance of avoiding a catastrophic climate. Save the Planet's partner organisation, CACE (Council and Community Action in the Climate Emergency), is currently focused on getting this full-scale mobilisation at local government level (you can see CACE's [work here](#)).

Save the Planet members can help the emergency mobilisation campaign by running for a local council in QLD, NSW and VIC this year and calling for emergency mobilisation by your local council and higher levels of government.

The theory of change we are working to is that if we can get one or two local governments undertaking full scale emergency mobilisation this will start a change reaction of other governments doing likewise, just as one council acknowledging the climate emergency started a global movement with a bit of help from grass root campaigners. Once adopted by local councils emergency mobilisation will ultimately spread upwards through state and federal governments.

OVERVIEW OF THE MAJOR PARTIES' CLIMATE POLICIES



The Liberal-National Party continue to undermine international efforts on global warming, maintain support for their fossil fuel allies and undermine renewable energy wherever they can. In the wake of the fires, sitting members still publicly deny the link of global warming to the current bushfire crisis, while others call for the opening of national parks to logging or the burning of anything yet burnt.

Labor's climate target is a suicidal net zero by 2050. While having some positive policies, many are tokenistic in scale and pale into insignificance when we compare the billions being spent on road upgrades or the opening up of the northern territory to fracking, continued support of coal mining or the continued logging of native forest. ALP also accepts money from Chevron who want to drill for oil in the Great Australian Bite.



The Greens' climate policy has barely moved in a decade changing recently from 'net zero or net negative in a generation', which corresponds to 25 years to 'net zero or net negative... no later than 2040'. Sadly the Greens are willing to take 10-15 years longer than is needed to hit negative emissions. This will result in the unnecessary loss of billions of animal lives and millions of human lives, species extinctions, and devastating loss of infrastructure but most importantly by only having a policy 10 years better than Labor's, it fails to force Labor into a stronger position and leaves Labor's numbers "men", happy to sit on net zero by 2050 despite the continuing devastation.

How does Save the Planet Compare?

Save the planet has whole-of-economy plan to achieve net negative emissions as soon as possible but not later than 10 years after we commence the emergency mobilisation response.

Our policy seeks to give us the best chance of avoiding catastrophic climate change while seeking maximum protection of human and non-human life and includes redesigning our current economic and political systems to enable a sustainable future to be implemented.
